
National Anti-Bullying Week






The Shadow Thief, by Alexandra Adornetto

SAFEGUARDING FOCUS - ONLINE SAFETY



As you know at Quest we are able to closely monitor what students are accessing. I thought in this news-letter I would include a few general Online Safety tips that may help at home.

- Talk to your children about their internet use. Your involvement is the best way of keeping them safe. They are likely to know more about online games and apps than you.
- Be Positive! The Internet is a fantastic resource for learning, communication and having fun. Just like in the real world, you need to take a few sensible precautions.
- Try not to overreact! This could simply make your child secretive about their internet use and make it harder to talk. Remember that this safety advice also applies to going online with a mobile phone.
- If you decide to use software to filter or monitor information from the internet, talk this over with your child. Any ground rules you agree will be much more effective.
- Locate computers in a family room (although this may not be realistic with teenagers, who guard their privacy closely!).
- Keep mobile phones out of children's bedrooms at night or ensure that they are not using them late into the night.

Restate with Respect

The target is to allow pupils the opportunity to change an inappropriate message or response to one that is socially acceptable. This might relate to the vocabulary used or their tone or volume of voice.

Facts

- Some pupils respond with words or a tone of voice that maybe interpreted as disrespectful by others. Often pupils are unable to recognise the importance of the paraverbal features (the vocal part of speech), such as tone of voice, inappropriate volume or cadence (CPI).
- They are unaware of the impact this can have on another person.
- There may be a tendency to use swearing and inappropriate language with the intention of shocking the listener or as a response to stress.

Suggested Script

Your tone of voice sounded rude. Please restate with respect Using bad language is not necessary. Please restate with respect

Hints and Tips

Remember that behaviour is communication and rudeness might indicate that something is wrong Once a pupil has restated respectfully, the adult should praise them and then move on, there should not be the need to reprimand them

We prefer polite

This target is to encourage pupils to improve their use of social language and appropriate manners. This can also be used to calmly discourage the use of bad language/swear words and/or inappropriate tone of voice

Facts

Some pupils are unable to monitor their tone of voice (or volume) and incorrect use can also be interpreted as rude.

Suggested Script

We prefer polite. I am not using bad language. Tell me again using polite words. Your tone of voice made you sound rude. Try again and use a quieter/gentler voice.

Hints and Tips

Do not expect change to occur quickly Ensure that you model the use of polite language with pupils Tell the pupil why it is important to be polite to others

Looking after them:

- 1) Preparing their food (this includes muesli and pellets) in separate bowls, this can be changed everyday (mine eat all their food normally).
- 2) Their water should also be changed every day, this is clipped onto the side of the cage (sometimes they wake me up in the night while they drink).
- 3) Their bedding needs a layer of sawdust on the bottom of the cage. There is another small layer of hay. I change this 1-2 times a week, otherwise this might upset them. It's changed because it gets really smelly, this is basically their toilet too.


