The second, and official, birthday is usually celebrated on the second Saturday in June. In fact, next year the nation will come together, the week before, over a four-day Bank Holiday weekend to celebrate The Queen's 70-year reign. The Queen usually spends her actual birthday privately, but the occasion is marked publicly by gun salutes in central London at midday. Official celebrations to mark the Sovereigns' birthday have often been held on a day other than the actual birthday, particularly when the actual birthday has not been in the summer when there was a greater likelihood of good weather for the Birthday Parade, also known as Trooping the Colour.

On her official birthday, Her Majesty is joined by other members of the Royal Family at the spectacular Trooping the Colour parade which moves between Buckingham Palace, The Mall and Horse Guards Parade as well as a public appearance on the balcony of Buckingham Palace.










1 Book of the Week 1

What are communication difficulties?

Communication is not simply about the ability to speak but also the ability to hear and understand what is said to us.

Some people may find it hard to ask a question, name an object or

Others may have problems processing information and difficulties with reading and writing. Some may use communication devices and require time to create their message.

Millions of people across the United Kingdom have communication difficulties, including both adults and children.

Through the training, Quest staff have gained the skills and knowledge to engage with people with communication difficulties much more effectively.

YEAR 11 – HAVE YOU CONSIDERED AN APPRENTICESHIP?

If your child is in Year 11 and is struggling to see themselves going to college, have you considered an apprenticeship?

What is an apprenticeship?

An apprenticeship is a type of job you can get from the age of 16 where you **work full-time** for a company but are also **trained** at the same time. You earn a salary and are treated like an employee, giving you all the independence and responsibility that you'd get if you went straight into a job, but at least 20% of your time will be spent in training, learning the hands-on skills you'll need to progress in your chosen career.

BOOK OF KNOWLEDGE

Words are where humans store knowledge. We will build our knowledge by reading. We can increase our vocabulary, improve our reading stamina, and enjoy reading.

Each week in JK Rowling class, we read an article on a new topic and then pick out facts that we find interesting and write them in our personal books of knowledge. We then zoom in on a word within the text and learn more about it through dictionary definitions, synonyms, syllable count and putting the word in a sentence.

Each week we recap new vocabulary that we have previously looked at. The aim of these sessions are to build vocabulary and improve skills in reading.

So what skills does 'Book of Knowledge' target?

Focus & Attention

Active listening, focused reading and following directions all require focus and attention. Learners are required to listen carefully and complete set tasks, independently read and identify facts from text.

Social Skills

Book of knowledge encourages learners to work both independently and collaboratively. The sessions target key social skills such as verbal communication, turn taking and giving eye contact to the speaker.

What can you do at home?

By playing word games at home, you can help to build your child's vocabulary outside of the classroom. Some examples of games you could play at home are:

- Letter and category game Choose a category and a letter and challenge your child to see how may words they can think of in that category.
- What can it do? Name an object that can be seen and challenge your child to think of five things that it can do or can be done with it. (e.g. Ball; roll, bounce, pop, inflate, kicked).
- Describe it Write down a range of different words, cut them out and put them in a hat, ask your child to pick out one word at a time and describe the word as best they can.


