


Book of the Week

GAME OF THE WEEK

Playing games with your children is a great way to improve social communication and language skills.

This week's game of the week is *Pictionary*. You don't need any special equipment, just a pencil and paper.

So what skills does Pictionary target?

Cognitive skills

The players must see and represent the word as images. Converting the word



into an image in the mind requires visualisation, imagination, memory, manipulation of mental images, and organisation of thoughts. All of these skills are essential when reading and understanding the written word. The act of drawing requires hand-eye coordination and fine motor skills.

Focus & Attention

Pupils have to 'think with their eyes' which involves looking and attending to the person and what they are drawing. This can improve observation skills.

Social skills


It's perfect to target social skills such as turn taking, communicating non-verbally and working as a team. This game requires rule following such as not talking and only drawing.

What do Quest pupils think about UNO?

APEX LEGEND - NEW GAME



Gaining more than 50 million players within a month of launch, Apex Legends is set to be the new gaming sensation everyone is talking about.

Rivalling the popular game Fortnite, Apex Legends is a free-to-play Battle Royale game where players can team up with two other players to make a squad, and then compete against nineteen other squads in a bid to be the last ones standing.

Is Apex Legends appropriate for my child?

Experts at the NSPCC feel that the game is similar to Fortnite but looks to be a grittier version. PEGI determines age suitability for platforms such as Xbox, PS4, PC and Nintendo, and has rated Apex Legends as suitable for children aged 16 and over, which is higher than the age rating of Fortnite (12 and over). PEGI does not take into consideration the chat features in games, therefore children could be exposed to inappropriate language from other players.

Know the risks

While you have to turn on voice chat to speak to others, the feature cannot be permanently turned off. There is no way of preventing players in your squad from talking to you, unless you mute them.

The gaming platform doesn't enable players to be reported within the game, making it a harder and longer process to do so if another user is being inappropriate. Users can be reported through the Origin website or via a console account.

Users can play and enjoy the game without using in-game chat as it has a 'pings' feature allowing users to send an automated message to their squad. This allows them to speak to each other purely for the benefit of the game, e.g. users can ask their team to revive them or to collect some weapons.

New Rugby school site visited by local MP Mark Pawsey on 25th March

Quest Academy is due to open its doors in September to 80 pupils

Local MP Mark Pawsey last week visited the site of the new Quest Academy in Rugby which will provide education for children with Special Educational Needs, such as autism and social, emotional and mental health needs.

The school, due to open its doors this September, will be the new home of Quest Academy and provide 80 places for boys and girls aged 9 - 19 years old. The academy, part of Macintyre Academies, is currently being run from a temporary site in Nuneaton, where it has enjoyed success. The brand-new site near Rugby Free Secondary School will greatly expand the opportunities it can offer to young people.

During his visit, Mark spoke with Nicola Wells, the Principal of Quest Academy, about her vision for the school's new home in Rugby. This includes not only all the educational facilities of a modern school, but also a café and shop near the entrance of the school and an educational psychologist, clinical psychologist and occupational therapist to help meet all the needs of the pupils there.

Speaking after visiting the site, Mark commented:

"I know from speaking to parents here in Rugby how important it is to ensure that every child gets the best possible education. Macintyre Academies has a great track record of delivering excellent education for children with Special Educational Needs and this new school will give many more children the opportunity to have the best start in life."

Mark continued:

"It was great to see how Nicola Wells' vision for the school has influenced the design of the buildings, so that the whole site can best meet the needs of the pupils. Alongside this, one of the most exciting things about the Quest Academy is its proximity to Rugby Free Secondary School, so there can be strong links to mainstream education."

Nicola Wells, Principal of Quest Academy, added:

"Everyone at Quest is passionate about making a difference to the lives of pupils and their families in Rugby and the surrounding areas. Being based in the local community will enable us to further improve our services so that we can continue to make a positive difference as well as build relationships with different stakeholders within the community."
