MELTING SNOWMAN BISCUITS

Get little ones in the kitchen to assemble these cute festive biscuits - sticky fun for a wintry afternoon. **Ingredients**

200g fondant icing sugar 6 white marshmallows 6 large cookies 24 mini chocolate beans 6 pretzel sticks Tube black writing icing **Method**



- 1) Put the icing sugar into a bowl and add cold water a teaspoon at a time until the mixture is runny but thick enough to coat a spoon.
- 2) Ask an adult to snip the marshmallows in half using wetted scissors.
- 3) Spoon a little icing onto each cookie and attach half a marshmallow. Using a little icing, stick the other half on top at an angle. Drizzle a little more icing onto the cookie to make melting snow.
- 4) Break the pretzel sticks in half and place on the cookie for arms. Stick orange chocolate beans on for the noses. Stick three chocolate beans on each cookie to represent buttons.
- 5) Using the writing icing, pipe small blobs for the eyes and mouth. Leave to set.

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

WhatsApp is the world's most popular messaging service, with around two billion users exchanging texts, photos, videos and documents, as well as making voice and video calls. Its end-to-end encryption means messages can only be viewed by the sender and any recipients: not even WhatsApp can read them. Updates to its privacy policy in 2021 (involving sharing data with parent company/Facebook) caused millions to leave the app, but the new policy was widely misinterpreted - it only related to WhatsApp's business features, not to personal messages.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

SCAMS

audsters occasionally send WhatsApp essages pretending to offer prizes – couraging the user to click on a link to n. Other common scams involve arning someone that their WhatsApp bscription has run out (aiming to dupe em into disclosing payment details) or personating a friend or relative and king for money to be transferred to ip with an emergency. Fraudsters of

DISAPPEARING MESSAGES

Users can set WhatsApp messages to disappear in 24 hours, 7 days or 90 days by default. Photos and videos can also be instructed to disappear after the recipient has viewed them. These files can't be saved or forwarded – so if your child was sent an inappropriate message, It would be difficult to prove any wrongdoing. However, the receiver can take a screenshot and save that as evidence.

ENABLING FAKE NEWS

WhatsApp has unfortunately been linked to accelerating the spread of dangerous rumours. In India in 2018, some outbreaks of mob violence appear to have been sparked by false allegations being shared on the app. WhatsApp itself took steps to prevent its users circulating hazardous theories and speculation in the early weeks of the Covid-19 pandemic.

POTENTIAL CYBERBULLYING

Group chat and video calls are great for connecting with multiple people in WhatsApp, but there is always the potential for someone's feelings to be hurt by an unkind comment or joke. The 'only admins' feature gives the admin(s) of a group control over who can send messages. They can, for example, block people from posting in a chat, which could make a child feel excluded and upset.

CONTACT FROM STRANGERS

only need the mobile number of the person you want to message (the other person also needs to have the app). WhatsApp can access the address book on someone's device and recognise which of their contacts also use the app. So if your child has ever given their phone number to someone they don't know, that person could use it to contact them via WhatsApp. To start a WhatsApp chat, you

LOCATION SHARING

The 'live location' feature lets users The 'live location' feature lets users share their current whereabouts, allowing friends to see their movements. WhatsApp describes it as a "simple and secure way to let people know where you are." It is a useful method for a young person to let loved ones know they're safe – but if they used it in a chat with people they don't know, they would be exposing their location to them, too.

CREATE A SAFE PROFILE

Even though someone would need a child's phone number to add them as a contact, it's also worth altering a young person's profile settings to restrict who can see their photo and status. The options are 'everyone', 'my contacts' and 'nobody' – choosing one of the latter two ensures that your child's profile is better protected.

LEAVE A GROUP

If your child is in a group chat that is making them feel uncomfortable, or has been added to a group that they don't want to be part of, they can use WhatsApp's group settings to leave. If someone exits a group, the admin can add them back in once; if they leave a second time, it is permanent. 41→

EXPLAIN ABOUT BLOCKING 🕬

If your child receives spam or offensive messages, calls or files from a contact, they should block them using 'settings' in the chat. Communication from a blocked contact won't show up on their device and stays undelivered Blocking someone does not remove them from your child's contact list - so they also need to be deleted from the address book.

THINK ABOUT LOCATION

If your child needs to use the 'live location' function to show you or one of their friends where they are, advise them to share their location only for as long as they need to. WhatsApp gives a range of 'live location' options, and your child should manually stop sharing their position as soon as it is no longer needed.

DELETE ACCIDENTAL MESSAGES

If your child posts a message they want to delete, WhatsApp allows the user seven minutes to erase a message. Tap and hold on the message, choose 'delete' and then 'delete for everyone.' However, it's important to remember that recipients may have seen (and taken a screenshot of) a message before it was deleted.

REPORT POTENTIAL SCAMS

Young people shouldn't engage with any message that looks suspicious or too good to be true. When your child receives a message from an unknown number for the first time, they'll be given the option to report it as spam. If the sender claims to be a friend or relative, call that person on their usual number to verify it really is them, or if it's someone trying to trick your child.

CHECK THE FACTS

You can now fact-check WhatsApp messages that have been forwarded at least five times, by double-tapping the magnifying glass icon to the right of the message. From there, your child can launch a Googie search and decide for themselves whether the message was true or not. 22



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CHOCOLATE BREAD

Ingredients to make the bread

250g Strong Flour ½ Teaspoon of Salt (2.5ml) 7g Pack of Yeast 150ml Warm Water

Method

- 1) Preheat the oven to 220c
- 2) Line baking tray with greaseproof paper
- 3) Sift the flour(250g) and salt(2.5ml) into mixing bowl
- 4) Stir in yeast (7g)
- 5) Make a well in the middle of the mixture and add the WARM water
- 6) Mix together to form a dough
- 7) Sprinkle flour on work surface
- 8) Knead the dough for **10** minutes
- 9) Split into 2 dough balls

HOW TO ASSEMBLE YOUR CHOCOLATE BREAD

Ingredients

50g /2 Tablespoons of melted Chocolate

Method

- 1) Roll your first dough ball into a triangle shape And move out the way
- 2) Do the same with your second dough ball
- 3) Put one of your triangles on baking paper and spread your chocolate on the dough
- 4) Lay your second triangle over the top and gently press down to seal together
- 5) Use a sharp knife to cut lines about 1cm apart these will form your branches
- 6) Cover with cling film and put on top of oven (**do not put the hob on**) to prove for 15 minutes
- 7) Twist each branch away from you a few times and press it down to baking tray.
- 8) Cook for approximately 10 minutes and enjoy

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BLACK FRIDAY- 25TH NOVEMBER

The term **Black Friday** was first used in America in 1869, when the stock market collapsed, causing a financial crisis. During the 1960s, the name started to be used in positive way, describing the fact that Philadelphia stores' profits moved from "red," meaning losses, to



"black," and saw profits (this goes back to the way business accounts used to be recorded). In the late 1980s, the shopping phenomenon grew even bigger, with retailers offering discounts, even drastically slashing prices, in order to draw crowds of shoppers.

In the 1990s, stores started opening up at midnight and people even began to camp out so that they could grab the first bargains. Black Friday started to spread worldwide.

In the early 2000s, retailers noticed that shoppers would go online the Monday after Thanksgiving, so in 2005, **Cyber Monday** was born. The idea took off. Online shopping over the Thanksgiving weekend raked in almost \$10 billion!

2010 saw the start of **Small Business Saturday** (day after Black Friday) taking advantage of the trend for people to shop local. Free online advertising helps retailers attract buyers.

Black Friday may have it's origins in America, however, it is now celebrated as a shopping holiday across the globe, with Canadian and British shoppers being the quickest to adopt it and add it to their calendars.

According to surveys, during **Black Friday 2021**, men in the UK planned to spend an average of £335, whilst women on average planned to spend £190. This is maybe no surprise since the UK has among the best Black Friday sales in the world where products are on average discounted by 63%!

TREE DRESSING DAY

Based on many old customs from all over the world and at different times of the year, *Tree Dressing Day* is on the 1st weekend of December (Saturday 3rd December 2022). It was initiated by Common Ground in 1990 and



has grown to become much more than an expression of a love for trees. It is a chance for communities to gather and celebrate our leafy friends. It's also chance for communities to reflect on the social and cultural history of their local area, and the role trees have played in shaping stories. Trees have long been celebrated for their spiritual significance. The simplicity of tying strips of cloth or yarn to a tree is universal and timeless. The old Celtic custom of tying cloth dipped in water from a holy well to a 'clootie tree' echoes the practice in Japan of decorating trees with strips of white paper, or *tanzaku*, bearing wishes and poems. The 21st century trend of 'yarn bombing' in Europe and North America transforms the local landscape with bright fabrics and yarns, like the Buddhist tradition of tying ribbons around the trunk of the Bodhi tree in homage to Buddha, or the annual Hindu festival of Raksha Bandhan when coloured strings are tied onto trees and plants to call upon the power of nature to protect loved ones.

These deep and diverse cultural associations provide a rich basis for tree festivities across the world. The act of dressing a tree binds us to it and celebrates the unique role that trees have in our local neighbourhoods. Wonder if decorating a Christmas Tree counts?
